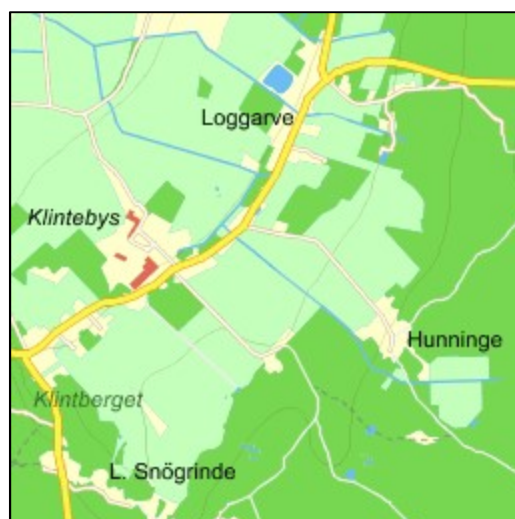

Olof Olofsson Loström died of a stroke in 1835.

Loggarve, where Olof Olofsson Loström was born, is close to Hunninge, where Anna Jonasdatter was born.



There are four stones called the Hunning Stones at Hunninge. The stones are in the Fornsalen which is part of the Gotland Museum and date back to the 700s or 800s.

The honey stones belong to the figurative stones of the late Iron Age. They can almost be read like a comic book, where you follow from picture to picture.

The stone is probably in memory of a man who died in battle. The images show him travelling on the ship of the dead to Oden's Valhalla. There he is welcomed by a woman with a drink. She probably represents the female figure, Valkyria, with the power to choose who will die in battle. On the upper part of the rock are warriors with the rings of honor in hand.

The picture below the ship can be interpreted as a scene from the story of the mythological hero, Sigurd Fafnesbane, where his brother-in-law, Gunnar, is thrown into the *worm* to die. At the bottom there are walled houses on a farm with a cow and two men who defend the farm with bows and arrows.
